The district also presented the Spirit of Grand Haven Area Public Schools award to Randy Poel. A lifelong GHAPS supporter, Poel has positively impacted countless lives with decades of service to GHAPS athletics, spearheading efforts to equip athletic facilities with automatic electronic defibrillator units, and as the county's first DARE officer.

Stellar in STEM

areers in science, technology, engineering and math (STEM) are thriving and growing, and offer great opportunities for students and their future careers. Students passionate about STEM subjects are also encouraged to participate in experiences beyond the traditional classroom. GHAPS supports this through extracurricular activities, fairs, clubs and competitive teams – like Science Olympiad and FIRST Robotics.

The Bucs have a longstanding tradition of Science Olympiad excellence, and this season was no exception as teams from Grand Haven High School, White Pines Intermediate and Lakeshore Middle School continued to demonstrate their science prowess. Mike Reed, with 25 years as head coach under his belt, was able to help his teams prepare for something they hadn't seen in three years: live competition.

The Science Olympiad Invitational at Allendale High School resulted in a second-place finish for the high school team, while Lakeshore and White Pines Intermediate captured first and fourth places in their division. With a short list of things to polish before the regional event, Coach Reed set to work with his students to make a couple of easy corrections.

On March 19, the three Grand Haven teams returned to the Region 12 Championship event hosted by Grand Valley State University. GHHS claimed the Regional Championship title – its 28th since its first win in 1986. Lakeshore and White Pines earned first and fourth place, respectively, in the middle school

division. All three teams advanced to the April 30 State Finals competition at Michigan State University.

At the state contest, GHHS competed against 40 teams and medaled in 19 of 23 events, including first place medals in the Bridge, Ornithology and Rocks and Minerals events. The performance earned the team its 18th State Championship. Lakeshore took 4th and White Pines 8th out of 34 teams in the middle school division.

The Bucs competed at the 38th Annual Science Olympiad National Tournament hosted virtually by Caltech on Saturday May 14. They are eagerly awaiting the results which will be released Wednesday, May 18.

Also in STEM, the high school's FIRST Robotics team, Buc-n-Gears, remains a serious state contender. The team was one of 160 schools, out of a field of 460, to qualify for the April State Tournament where their performance in the Ford Division qualified the team for national competition.

Coach Chuck Priese began coaching FIRST Robotics at GHHS in 2011 when his daughter was a student. "Students come out of this with so much handson skill and ability they can take with them into the job world," explains Priese, who is proud of the way his students persevered, seeding 15th out of 40 teams and making it through to the state's semi-final round.

"The competitions are intense, and require the kids to put in about 160 hours of meeting time in the six weeks leading to the event," says Priese. "Gracious professionalism, cooperation, communication skills, strategy and maintaining a business atmosphere," are among the valuable lessons his students benefit from, "But it's the thrill of the sport that draws them in," he says.

Therapy Pups Make Ruff Days a Little Brighter

Positive, nurturing classrooms and a vibrant sense of belonging go a long way to set the stage for learning in GHAPS schools. But whether you're an adult or a first-grader, the outside world can be scary sometimes. Even before the pandemic, social, emotional, behavioral and mental health services in our schools were critical in addressing rising needs. Woven throughout district initiatives, these programs, events, activities and services are making a huge impact on student learning and success.

As educators, we know that students are most available to learn when their psychological and safety needs are being met. Throughout the district, you'll find that schools have been remarkably innovative and compassionate in finding ways to wholistically support students, and one another, during difficult times. A concerted focus on growth mindset, calming jars and mindfulness lessons, 'safe spaces' in classrooms and even emotional support animals are just a few examples.

"So many kids were struggling with anxiety, big emotions, trouble transitioning," shares Amy Polston, first-grade teacher at Rosy Mound Elementary. "I saw the benefits that therapy dogs brought to my previous school, and when I approached Principal Blanding he was incredibly supportive."

Polston sought out Emmy, a golden retriever puppy, who was chosen for her lovely temperament. As a puppy, a lot of

her training was about play, meeting new people, experiencing new things and basic obedience. When Emmy was one, Polston applied for a grant that enabled her to work alongside a professional trainer to prepare Emmy with the skills required for certification.

Emmy, who celebrates her fourth birthday on May 19, is now a beloved member of the Rosy Mound staff along with her colleague Porter, a black lab. Dakota, also a golden retriever, is on duty at White Pines Intermediate, and social worker Kristi Rob is working with a new dog in training at Central High School.

Emmy's work day starts bright and early as she welcomes students to school each day. Her favorite part of the day, readers workshop, is next. "She loves when the kids snuggle up and read to her. Kids who are less comfortable reading in front of adults are at ease with her," explains Polston. She helps with writing too. "When they're sitting next to Emmy their attitude and work ethic shifts."

Emmy is a huge support to staff, too. "The impact that she's had not only on the students but adults as well is incredible. Everyone just loves her," shares Polston. Some of Emmy's other duties include attending staff meetings, lunch and recess. When Emmy needs a break, she visits Polston's classroom office and enjoys a snooze on her dog bed, a drink of water and a snack (if she's not too full from lunch duty).

Even after a hard day's work, Emmy still has plenty of energy and loves living her best dog life. "She goes for a hike every day, plays with other dogs. She is part of our family," shares Polston. •

Making Connections

ur West Michigan community is vibrant with agriculture, from grain crops to berries bursting with flavor. And, many of our neighbors are among one of Michigan's largest migrant communities. A vital part of our GHAPS family, the district is dedicated to making sure these families and their young learners feel at home and supported.

Infusing diversity, equity, inclusion and belonging (DEIB) practices into our school culture is a critical piece of Success for All. One of GHAPS' champions in this area is Abby Teasley, who was recently recognized by West Michigan Works! with the 2021 Beverly A. Drake Essential Service Award for "going above and beyond" in her role as a front-line worker assisting migrant families. In her role as GHAPS' home liaison and migrant recruiter, Teasley works to make connections between families and important resources including school and daycare programs, food, housing and health care.

Growing up in the Ottawa County migrant program, Teasley finds that her experiences have helped her relate to other migrant families. "I remember more than 20 years ago when we came to Grand Haven, there were few Hispanic families in the area," recalls Teasley. "I am proud of how far the community has come. Collaborations make it work. I'm thankful."

Planning is now underway for the community's second-annual Welcoming event, which will be held at Grand Haven's Hope Church on June 30. Building on last year's success, dozens of community partners will be available to connect with migrant families, facilitate access to resources, and enjoy food and activities. Making sure migrant students enroll in summer school programs is another focus area for Teasley, who sees the opportunity to address educational gaps, support English language learners, and create a sense of community among students. "These kids are so resilient. New places, new friends every time. They're amazing," shares Teasley. "I do this work because it's my passion. It's truly an honor and it goes both ways; I am blessed by them as well." •
