



Ceramics I

Course Number: L66 Grade Level: 9th (2nd Semester), 10th, 11th, 12th Credits : 1/2 Credit Prerequisite Courses : Must have passed Introduction to Studio Arts or Introduction to Digital Arts

Course Description

Ceramics I, an intermediate level art course, is designed to provide students with an understanding of the clay material and its potential for three-dimensional objects. Students will use the creative process to design ceramic art work and will have the opportunity to explore hand-building clay construction methods and surfacing techniques. In addition, ceramic terminology, clay geology, ceramic history/ceramic artists and ceramic appreciation are included in this course. Ceramics I will include handbuilding techniques, which is a prerequisite for learning the potter's wheel in Ceramics II.

Course Objectives

- * to explore ceramic building techniques
- * to explore surfacing techniques
- * to create aesthetically pleasing 3-dimensional ceramic art products
- * to gain understanding and mastery of craftsmanship in clay
- * to evaluate art products
- * to increase perceptual awareness
- * to employ the creative process in designing ceramic objects
- * to employ the Elements of Art and Principles of Design
- * to understand the possibilities and limitations inherent to the clay medium
- * to master terminology specific to ceramics
- * to understand clay geology and clay bodies
- * to gain in knowledge of ceramic history, ceramic artists, as well as, ceramic appreciation

Student Expectations

- 1. **REQUIRED MATERIALS AND COURSE FEES:** There is a \$35.00 MATERIALS FEE to take this class, which is due the first week of school. If writing a check, please make your check out to Grand Haven High School. Write "Ceramics" in the memo. Students will be given a supply kit and will be responsible for properly maintaining and returning all materials at the end of the semester. A fee will be assessed if supplies go missing or are damaged.
- 2. **CLASS TIME:** Students are expected to participate daily in class and be on-task for assigned activities. This includes studio work, critiques, the proper use, care, and clean

All portfolio artworks will require a self-evaluation. It is crucial to complete and sign all ceramic pieces, due to the firing and storage processes. Incomplete, unsigned work will not be accepted. Please review your teacher's late work policy. *Due to the nature of clay construction, drying time, kiln firings and glazing, it is crucial to be in attendance throughout the semester in order to keep current in the class.
- 4. ASSESSMENTS (TESTS, QUIZZES, FINAL EXAM): Students are responsible for preparing for tests/quizzes (via in-class instruction and construction experiences, note taking, google classroom and outside of class studying).

Grading Policy

CLASS WORK/STUDIO WORK: (30%) Studio work will include tests/guizzes, note taking, self-evaluations, sketchbook design exercises and glaze recording, preliminary research, maintaining clay moisture levels, daily progress, clean up and studio etiquette. **PORTFOLIO:** (70%) A portfolio is the collection of art products created during class. These will be evaluated based on creativity, technique, craftsmanship and level of mastery. As a reminder, ceramic pieces must be signed in order to be fired in the kiln and graded.

FINAL EXAM:

A final exam will be given that will include a written test and the average of the portfolio grades throughout the semester.

SEMESTER GRADE: The semester grade will be an average of the term grade (80%), and the final exam (20%).
