

United States History A Grand Haven High School



Course Number: C42A Grade Level: Sophomore

Credits: .5

Prerequiste Courses: Successful completion of World History is recommended.

Course Description

This course is a comprehensive study of the United States in the Twentieth Century, focusing on themes and issues that have shaped the first half of the 20th Century from the 1880's to World War II. This course will take an American perspective with key focus on America's interaction with the world at large and the ways in which the events in the world have shaped the American experience. Eras of study include founding documents, Industrialism, Progressive Era, WWI, Roaring 20's, 29 the Great Depression, and the events leading up to WWII. Persuasive writing is introduced with repeated practice in the context of U.S. History. This course is required for graduation.

Course Objectives

Students will develop critical reading skills that allow them to interpret both primary and secondary sources., including recognizing the author's viewpoint and biases, understanding the intended message and audience, and using inferences and prior knowledge to relate the reading to other situations

Students will develop writing skills, particularly in argumentative writing, including constructing a clear thesis, supporting that thesis with specific, appropriate evidence, and recognizing and addressing valid counter-arguments.

Students will develop verbal skills, such as asking thoughtful questions, answering questions with specific evidence, and persuading others in a variety of group settings

Student Expectations

Reading is an essential part of every social studies class. Students must come to class prepared, with all reading and other assignments completed.

Students must take ownership of their own learning. This means asking questions when confused, answering questions when able, and keeping track of their own missing or incomplete assignments.

Because the social studies department believes in the importance of informed citizenship, students must behave as such in the classroom. This means challenging their own assumptions while being polite both to their fellow students and their teacher.
