6th Grade Projects

<u>Capturing Kid's Hearts</u>: Each marking period, all classes begin with an "introduction of self" writing assignment followed by a quality team-building activity (that leads to the creation of our **classroom contracts**). We also cover art classroom procedures.

<u>Monogram Design</u>: (Sketchbook/journal cover). Students use the initials of their name to create a monogram design that must include overlap, values, and embellishments. **Vocabulary**: design, shape, space, uniformity, overlap, interconnect, values, texture, geometric, organic

<u>Drawing</u>: sketches include drawing from life (still life, hand, found objects, and/or shoe): the goal is to enhance drawing skills and practice shading

Vocabulary: line, texture, contour line, sketch, shading, highlight, gray (middle value), shadow

Still Life (Drawing and Painting assignment): Students draw from a real still life (arrangement of objects). This drawing is averaged into the drawing unit (along with their sketches). They then paint according to the following color theory criteria: use of warm color in the foreground, an area of analogous/tertiary colors, and values (shading of objects). Students also practice **color mixing** (creating a simple color wheel) and then **shading** (simple shape monochromatic painting of values) as part of this unit. The resulting still life painting requires a lot of planning, thinking, and problem-solving skills on the part of the artist.

<u>Vocabulary</u>: Contour line, overlap, primary color, secondary color, tertiary color, analogous color, warm and cool colors, complimentary color, values in paint (tints and shades), overlap, foreground, middle ground, background


<u>Sculpture</u>: students choose a favorite animal with four legs or two arms and two legs (as with a chimp) to recreate into a three-dimensional clay sculpture. Classes visit the computer lab to gather photos to reference during the sculpting process. (We learn how to copy/paste/crop on the new word program at school). Using clay, students build mass and create form as well as add a sense of movement to their sculpture.

Vocabulary: shape, form, sculpture, join, build, animate, clay, pinch, coil, slab, throw, bisque, fire, kiln

(Cultural reference: Oaxacan Art of Mexico).

Oaxaca is located in southern Mexico. Combining a centuries old tradition of wood carving with a fanciful sense of form and adding the Mexican flair for bright, surprising color schemes, you get the famous "alebrijes," or animal carvings of Oaxaca. Found in museums and galleries throughout the United States and other countries, these works are recognized as a supreme expression of the best of Mexican folk art.

The animals are brightly painted and several areas of various textures are added.
